

Double Masters in Translation Studies

The Double Masters in Translation Studies is the result of collaboration between the Monash Translation Studies program and the English Studies department at Jean Moulin University (Lyon, France).

The two-year degree is aimed at French and Australian students who wish to become translators. Students follow courses in English and French and are totally immersed in two cultures, as they spend a full year in Australia and a full year in France.

Courses are based on theory and practice and are taught collaboratively by academics and professional translators. A special feature of the degree is the opportunity to work in industry for several months with professional translators. This work experience should provide them with key contacts and excellent opportunities for their future career.

Graduates qualify with two masters degrees. The Monash Translation Studies program is approved by NAATI (National Accreditation Authority for Translators and Interpreters).



Student profile

Charlotte Baines

PhD

In November 2008 Charlotte Baines was elected as a councillor on the City of Monash for a second term. She was also elected Deputy Mayor at the age of 26. After achieving a first class honours degree in Arts (Sociology) and Law, Charlotte decided to undertake a PhD in sociology. "I am studying sociology because I am fascinated with the study of society, and the way governments represent religious interests. I particularly want to learn how religion and state relations can be improved under the Rudd Labor Government. In Australia, politicians and researchers are still learning how to get the balance right. In the future I hope to use my research to stimulate public debate on the role of religion in federal politics, and to improve the representation of religious interests in policy and law."

All that jazz

Pianist and Composer Dr Tony Gould from the University's School of Music-Conservatorium was awarded Australia's most prestigious individual music prize – the Don Banks Music Award 2009. The Australia Council presented the eminent jazz pianist and composer with the \$60,000 award at a ceremony celebrating his rich contribution to Australian music at Bennetts Lane Jazz Club in February.

Australia Council chief executive officer Kathy Keele said that Dr Gould's achievements placed him at the forefront of Australian jazz and improvised music.

"Dr Gould's work combining improvisation with classical music traditions has been the key to his enormous impact on Australian music, and especially on his many students. He has been at the vanguard of improvised music and helped craft a distinctive Australian musical voice."

Dr Gould completed a Master of Arts at Monash University and currently teaches in the School of Music.

Dr Gould's career stretches over more than 30 years. He has more than 13 original recordings under his belt, including collaborations with some of Australia's most eminent jazz musicians including John Sangster and David Jones, and has supported some of the biggest names in jazz, from Dave Brubeck to Oscar Peterson. His full orchestral version of Dylan Thomas' *Under Milk Wood* was premiered by the Queensland Philharmonic Orchestra.

Recent awards include: APRA / Australian Music Centre (AMC) Classical Music Award for Outstanding Contribution to Australian Music in Education (2005); Australia Council Music Board Fellowship (2006-2007); Distinguished Artist residency at Arthur Boyd's artist's studios in Bundanon (2007); Order of Australia (2007).

Research degrees

Doctor of Philosophy

The PhD program offered in the Faculty of Arts enables students to complete extensive, independent research under the supervision of an expert academic. When completed, this research must make a valuable contribution to the current body of knowledge on their chosen topic. The University can provide expert supervision in a large and diverse number of disciplines.

Course Outline

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) by 100 per cent research is available in a range of disciplines and is taken by submission of a thesis on a topic – decided in consultation with staff in the students' chosen discipline – approved by the school.

The PhD is also available, with a varied course structure, in a number of specific disciplines:

Critical theory: combination of thesis and coursework – Creative writing: submission of creative work and exegesis – Music composition: submission of a composition folio and critical commentary – Theatre performance: submission of a performance project and critical commentary

Career Outlook

For employers, a PhD indicates superior levels of analytical and research skills that can be applied to a broad range of industries depending on the thesis topic.

For others, research is the basis of an academic career and a PhD is the entry level for an academic position in most Australian universities. Strong growth in the tertiary education sector means demand for academic staff, and many universities are actively recruiting staff, both here and internationally.

Doctor of Philosophy (Monash Asia Institute)

This course provides postgraduate students with a unique opportunity to undertake doctoral and masters research in cross-disciplinary areas.

The Monash Asia Institute is able to do this due to its close relationship to the 10 faculties of the University across all its campuses in Australia and overseas. Joint supervision across the disciplines allows students to maximise their access to the academic specialists.

Course Outline

The degree of Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) by 100 per cent research is taken by submission of a thesis on a topic – decided in consultation with staff in the students' chosen discipline.

Expert academic supervision is available in a diverse number of disciplines including South East Asian studies, anthropology, economics, nutrition and health, Japanese studies, Indian studies, terrorism, international politics, religion and Islam.

Career Outlook

People do research for a number of reasons. It may be a passion for a particular topic or a desire to make a change in the world. For some, it's a career investment, an opportunity to acquire specialist knowledge to gain an edge in the workplace. For others, research is about satisfying an innate curiosity or a desire to explore new frontiers.

Master of Arts

A Master of Arts by 100 per cent research enables students to undertake substantial independent research on a chosen topic while under the supervision of an academic.

Course Outline

Candidates undertaking the Master of Arts by 100 per cent research are expected to submit a thesis of 30,000 to 40,000 words.

Master of Arts (Creative Writing)

Candidates submit a component of creative writing – a novel or a novella or a group of short stories or a play or a group of plays or a sequence of poems or a portfolio of creative works of various genres. The creative writing component submitted for examination as part of the thesis must be undertaken during the enrolment in the MA, under supervision. An accompanying critical commentary of the creative writing component will constitute a scholarly, self-reflective critique, based on research into the theory and practice of the creative process focused on the student's creative writing component, the writing of which will itself be considered as an act of research into the nature of literary creativity. The critical commentary will involve thoroughly researching the various aspects of the creative writing project: the creative process, the characteristics of the attempted genre, the mechanics of handling language and narrative, the influence of other relevant writers, context, and the shaping elements in a work of art.

Course Outline

At the completion of the course, candidates submit for examination a component of their own creative writing of 20,000 to 25,000 words, together with a critical explanation of 10,000 to 15,000 words. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Career Outlook

Skills in creative writing are in demand across many industry sectors including publishing, media and journalism.

Duration: 2 years full-time, 4 years part-time

Intake: Throughout the year

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/research experience considered equivalent to one of the above. Applicants must also demonstrate experience in or a capacity for creative writing through submission of a portfolio of creative works.

2009 annual domestic fee: Research Training Scheme

Master of Arts (Music Composition)

The degree is designed to enable composers to develop a distinctive voice and to research and acquire a range of compositional techniques. Students create a folio of original compositions. Through regular work in the studios, students acquire a knowledge of music technology and an understanding of music technology as a compositional tool.

Course Outline

In close consultation with their supervisor, candidates develop a folio consisting of both musical scores and sound recordings that demonstrate their ability to work in various media, including traditional, electro-acoustic, and contemporary solo and chamber combinations. The overall duration of the submitted music would normally be between 30 to 45 minutes. Together with the folio of compositions, candidates are required to write a critical commentary of between 10,000 and 15,000 words.

Career Outlook

This course is ideal for composers interested in developing their own compositional voice, and to research and acquire a range of compositional techniques. The research conducted may form the beginning of the student's professional career. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification considered equivalent to one of the above (a minimum of a Bachelor degree with substantial professional experience in the field). Applicants must also demonstrate their ability to compose through the submission of at least two original musical works to the satisfaction of the School of Music's Coordinator of Composition.

Master of Arts (Theatre Performance)

The Master of Arts (Theatre Performance) by 100 per cent research offers the opportunity to combine creative output with practice-based research.

A major requirement is to produce a live performance normally in one of the fields of directing, theatre making, musicals, dramatic writing or theatre design. The performance will embody the results of research into the contexts, theoretical influences, aesthetic elements and performance-making processes of the project.

Course Outline

Candidates develop and present a live performance in a public venue, and submit a critical commentary. The performance will normally be 50 to 60 minutes and the commentary 10,000 to 15,000 words. The equivalent combined word total is 35,000 to 40,000 words.

Career Outlook

Academic staff members offer postgraduates a wide range of expertise and career advice across the entire field of performance, from theatre practice to theatre history, theory and practice. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Duration: 2 years full-time, 4 years part-time

Campus: Clayton

Intake: Throughout the year

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/research experience considered equivalent to one of the above.

An applicant's degree must be in Theatre or Performing Arts or related discipline, or the equivalent, which would normally be an undergraduate degree in a relevant discipline and substantial documented professional experience. All candidates must submit evidence of practical work in the field.

Master of Bioethics

This research program focuses on ethical issues raised by medicine and the biomedical sciences. Areas of research strength include ethical issues in patient care, the ethics of clinical trials, ethical problems of resource allocation, medical end-of-life decisions, new reproductive technologies, nursing ethics, surrogacy, disability and discrimination, moral psychology and moral development.

Course Outline

Students undertake a program of research under supervision and submit a thesis of 30,000 to 40,000 words.

Career Outlook

This course will be of interest to health care professionals, teachers in the health-care field, and those with a general interest in the area. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Duration: 2 years full-time, 4 years part-time

Campus: Clayton

Intake: Throughout the year

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/research experience considered equivalent to one of the above.

Master of Environmental Science

The Master of Environmental Science by 100 per cent research is concerned with the interactions between humans and their bio-geological contexts with the aim of reintegrating the two with the insights offered by both the humanities and the sciences.

Research emphasises the processes behind human-environment interactions, the development of policy, and the implementation of management strategies favourable to the environment.

The program offers a primary insight into the nature of the environmental issues through core coursework units involving interdisciplinary research experience and an understanding of the social construction of the issues.

Course Outline

Students undertake a program of research (under supervision) and submit a thesis of 30,000 to 40,000 words. Research topics are decided in consultation with staff in the students' chosen discipline.

Career Outlook

Postgraduate research in geography and environmental science offers the possibility of working with leading academics from around the world given the urgent need to work towards solutions on global environmental issues. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.



Student profile

Felix Nobis

PhD

"Having come to tertiary education quite late, I had already established some professional and personal interests that would define my research. I began undergraduate studies as a mature-age student at University College Cork, Ireland. Combining my professional interest in performance with an academic interest in history and language, I went on to write an MA in medieval theatre.

I had worked several years as a professional actor, increasingly in the field of storytelling, and saw a unique opportunity to combine my professional and academic experience in the form of a PhD in medieval storytelling.

I chose Monash because it offered a balance between the academic and the practical sides of performance. I was accepted on a Teaching-Research scholarship and have been able to develop my teaching skills while also receiving the financial benefits of being a part-time staff member. Certainly one of the greatest considerations of full-time study is financial. Over the last two years I have twice interrupted my research to pursue professional engagements. On both occasions however, I have been able to incorporate the professional work into my research.

I enjoy the vibrant atmosphere in the Centre for Drama and Theatre Studies. I enjoy working with the students, and sharing that balance between research and practice. For me they are as important as each other, and it is a balance I will seek to maintain after graduation."

Degrees by coursework and research

Master of Arts by research and coursework

This combined degree allows students the flexibility to complete part of the course by following a unit-based program (66 per cent) and part of the course by completing a research thesis. Students complete coursework in their first semester, then have one year to write a thesis of 20,000 to 25,000 words on a chosen topic.

Students complete two units and a thesis specific to their chosen area of study.

Students at Monash University Sunway campus must complete two units plus a 66 per cent thesis of 20,000 to 25,000 words. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Career Outlook

This course provides students who already have previous studies in an arts discipline with the opportunity to expand, update and deepen their knowledge and understanding through a combination of research and coursework activities in a range of disciplines. This course also provides a pathway to the PhD program.

Course Details

Course code: 2846

Duration: 1.5 years full-time, 3 years part-time

Campus: Caulfield, Clayton

Intake: First semester, second semester

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/research experience considered equivalent to one of the above. Note: - Applicants who have completed an Australian or New Zealand postgraduate coursework qualification (or equivalent) without a research component are also eligible for admission if they achieved a minimum Distinction result for 75% of the total course.

Master of Arts (Music Performance)

Performance is at the heart of the Monash School of Music-Conservatorium programs and students can engage in a wide cross-section of musical activities, both within and outside formal study programs. For example, every year students have the opportunity to travel to the University's Prato Centre near Florence and work with visiting artists on areas such as chamber music, jazz, language classes for singers and solo performance.

Course Outline

This is a combined research (66 per cent) and coursework degree. Students research an approved topic in music performance and prepare a high-quality recital performance of challenging works that are recorded and submitted as part of a portfolio along with a program booklet and explanatory research essay for examination.

Students complete a core unit – Directed reading in music – and a research project. In addition, students must complete a portfolio comprising a 60-minute solo or solo and ensemble recital which is recorded on compact disc and submitted with a recital annotation booklet of 1500 words and a research essay of 9000 words in a bound folder.

Career Outlook

On completion of this course, students should have developed instrumental or vocal performance skills and self-confidence to the level required for professional performance and widened their knowledge of repertoire and style. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Duration: 1.5 years full-time, 3 years part-time

Campus: Clayton

Intake: First semester, second semester

Entry requirements: Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of distinction or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/work experience considered equivalent to one of the above (a minimum of a Bachelor degree with substantial professional experience in the field).

Auditions are compulsory. In the case of overseas or interstate students, a video recording of a performance will be accepted for consideration of entry in lieu of an audition.

Master of Environmental Science by research and coursework

Research emphasises the processes behind human-environment interactions, the development of policy, and the implementation of management strategies favourable to the environment. The program offers a primary insight into the nature of the environmental issues through core coursework units involving interdisciplinary research experience and an understanding of the social construction of the issues.

Course Outline

The course is based around the following key study areas:

Perspectives on environment and sustainability and one of:

Environmental analysis – Frontiers in sustainability and environment – Environmental governance and citizenship

Students also complete a thesis of 20,000 to 25,000 words (supervised within either the Faculty of Arts or Faculty of Science).

Career Outlook

The course has been designed to both broaden and deepen students' existing knowledge, providing intensive interdisciplinary as well as disciplinary research training in either the Faculty of Arts or the Faculty of Science. This course also provides a pathway to a PhD.

Duration: 1.5 years full-time, 3 years part-time

Campus: Clayton

Intake: First semester

Entry requirements: Entry requirements are either Normally a four-year Australian or New Zealand bachelors degree with honours or equivalent awarded at H2A or above (normally with a research component in the fourth year); or an Australian or New Zealand masters preliminary qualification with a significant research component and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand coursework masters degree with a significant research component graded at distinction or above and an overall result of H2A or above; or an Australian or New Zealand research masters degree with an overall result of H2A or above; or a qualification/work experience considered equivalent to one of the above. Note: Applicants who have completed an Australian or New Zealand postgraduate coursework qualification without a research component or equivalent are eligible if they achieved a minimum distinction result for 75% of the total course.

Coursework degrees

Master of Global Studies

The Master of Global Studies is an inter-disciplinary program that will provide students with advanced knowledge and theoretical perspectives on contemporary global issues and the ways that national governments and non-government bodies are engaging with these. It covers a broad range of themes, such as international relations theories and practice, global civil society, international business and concepts of nationalism and post-colonialism. The course will engage with issues affecting the contemporary human condition such as social justice, human rights and environmental sustainability in a global context.

Course Outline

Students complete core units in three of the following areas: The world since 1900; International relations or Perspectives on world politics; Global justice and Civilising global politics. They study at least one of the following: Globalising research methods; Global research project or Global workplace project and complete two further units in the remaining semester.

Career Outlook

Through engagement with issues affecting the contemporary human condition, such as social justice, human rights and environmental sustainability and a focus on problem-based and workplace-centred projects, graduates will be able to apply their knowledge and skills directly into professional contexts.

Duration: 1.5 years full-time, 3 years part-time

Campus: Caulfield

Intake: First semester, second semester

Entry requirements: A bachelors degree or equivalent with a distinction average in the final year.

Marilyn Johnson

A keen interest in learning all she could about research, coupled with a desire to build skills that would allow her to work as an active, collaborative researcher, were key influences in Marilyn Johnston's decision to enrol in a Masters of Applied Social Research at Monash.

Working full-time while studying presented challenges but Marilyn attributes the standard of excellence she achieved in her course to extensive online resources, in particular journal subscriptions, and the high calibre of teaching staff.

"They understood the demands of time management but they didn't compromise too much – they had high expectations and confidence in my ability to produce excellent work."

Following her Masters, Marilyn worked for the Parliament of Victoria as principal researcher for the Inquiry into Pedestrian Safety tabled in Parliament in 2006 and then as a researcher with the Ethics Committee in the Department of Justice.

She is the inaugural recipient of the Amy Gillett Foundations' Safe Family Research Scholarship which has allowed her to return to study as a full-time PhD student at the Monash University Accident Research Centre where she is working on ways to improve cycling safety through a better understanding of the interaction between cyclists and other road users.

Bioethics

"I work as a policy manager at the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Authority in the UK. The HFEA is responsible for both regulating and developing policy around fertility technology and embryology.

A major part of the work I am involved in is as a member of the secretariat of the Ethics and Law Advisory Group at the HFEA.

As part of this work I recently presented a paper regarding the ethical and public interest issues that may arise during the licensing of research involving genetically modified human embryos.

When I first decided to take on postgraduate study in bioethics this was exactly the sort of career I had in mind. There's an increasing demand for bioethics graduates in the health policy arena – in my department alone there are five of us with Masters (or pending Masters) in bioethics or health law and medical ethics degrees."

Master of Oral History and Historical Memory

Oral history illuminates the lived experience of hidden histories and produces riveting historical documentary in books, radio and television, museum exhibitions and multi-media production. Historical memory has become central to the contemporary cultural politics of witnessing, commemoration and reconciliation.

This innovative course, taught by international leaders in the field, combines the study of oral history and historical memory. Students will consider national and international case studies and literature in the field of oral history and historical memory, and can take electives in the related fields of public history and life writing, and will develop practical and vocational skills through work placements and interview projects.

Course Outline

Students complete two core subjects, Recording oral history: Theory and practice, and History and memory: Oral history, life stories and commemoration.

Students complete two electives from the following or other approved School of Historical Studies units: History, biography and autobiography – Reading and writing biography and life stories – Local and community history – Family history and genealogy – History and heritage – History and the museum – Holocaust memories

Students also complete one of the following options: Public history placement and research project in history, and Research project.
